Kootenay National Park

Kootenay National Park is a land of startling contrasts. From glaciers to grasslands, broad vistas to narrow canyons, icy rivers to steamy hot springs - this place has it all!

Every twist and turn of the highway reveals something interesting to explore: the blue-grey walls of Marble Canyon, fuchsia-coloured fireweed lining trails to backcountry treasures, and the red cliffs and shattered rock of Sinclair Canyon. Kootenay's dramatic southern entrance, framed by vertical walls of rock, rivals any in Canada.

Established in 1920, Kootenay National Park was created as part of an agreement between the provincial and federal governments to build the Banff-Windermere Highway (93 South) connecting the Columbia Valley to Banff and Calgary. The highway was completed in 1922 and officially opened on June 23rd, 1923.

### **SEASONAL SIGHTINGS**

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#### **Spring**

Wildflowers make their first appearance in the Redstreak area in April. Wildlife can frequently be seen feeding along the highway.



### Summer

The best time to camp and explore Kootenay's diverse hiking experiences: from short, family-friendly trails to multi-day adventures.



#### **Autumn**

A spectacular time to hike in Kootenay. Crimson fireweed and golden larches light up the Sinclair, Floe Lake and Stanley Glacier trails.



### Winter

Draws skilled ice climbers and skiers to Kootenay's north end. In the evening, nothing beats a relaxing soak in the hot springs.

- 3 Soak in some history and learn how wildlife safely cross the road at the Radium Hot Springs.
- 4 Learn about wildlife fences and underpasses with self-guided activities. Fun for kids!
- 5 Snap a selfie in one of Kootenay's Red Chairs at Marble Canyon, Sinclair Canyon, or Simpson River.

- 6 Learn how fire keeps forests healthy on the Fireweed, Simpson River and Redstreak Restoration interpretive trails.
- 7 Lace up your hiking boots for an epic backcountry adventure on the Rockwall or Kindersley-Sinclair trails!
- 8 Enjoy Sinclair Canyon from above and below hike the Juniper trail from the Radium Hot Springs to the park's west gate.
